Message from the Administration

The school year is now in full swing. It is great to see students settle into their classroom routines and to watch the learning that is happening.

I would like to thank the parents that came out to our Meet the Teacher night and our Grade 12 Graduation Information evening. Thank you also to the parents who came out to our Friends of Hilltop School Council in September. I am pleased to inform you that Tammy Dickson is once again our Chair. The Friends of Hilltop are still looking for a treasurer. If you would like to volunteer, please come to our next meeting on October 17.

I encourage all parents to sign in to the Parent Portal on PowerSchool. There is an app available. Please check with the office if you need assistance accessing your username and password.

FLEX has now started for the 2018-2019 school year. Approximately twice a month, students will have the period prior to lunch (period 3) for Learning Recovery and/or Personal Learning Time. This Tutorial period is supervised and students are expected to attend when they have a teacher request they do so. Parents must be contacted with the relevant information ahead of time so that they can help to support the student learning at home. Students and parents may also request the student participate in these sessions. Any students who are not referred or do not request Tutorial will have an extended lunch hour on these days. Teachers plan learning activities or homework these days. Nominated students who miss FLEX will serve a detention. Parents cannot excuse a student who is nominated for FLEX.

Meanwhile, teachers will be working in groups (Professional Learning Communities-PLCs) to create common lessons, units and assessments as well as to analyze Hilltop's relevant data so as to continue to improve upon the education programs we provide to our students.

Parents, please phone the school if your child is going to be late or absent. If we do not get a phone call, your child will be admitted to class, but will be given a detention. Parents will have until 11:30 am to call in and forgive the detention. If students skip a detention, they will then receive an in-school suspension. We appreciate our parents' support in ensuring students are in class.

I would like to remind parents that our doors open at 8 am. Students will have access to the building after this time.

Lastly, I would like to wish everyone a Happy Thanksgiving. Students have a four day weekend beginning on October 5 which is a professional development and planning day for staff. Monday, October 8 is Thanksgiving. Enjoy the long weekend.








Thank you Lorraine Jackson from Careers: the Next Generation for taking the time to speak to our students about the Registered Apprenticeship Program. Mrs. Jackson explained to students how the RAP program operates and how students have the opportunity to earn high school credits while being paid to advance from an apprentice to journeyman in various trade industries. There is currently a shortage in several trades such as; health care, financial, retail, public service, tourism and restaurant industry, students were encourages to explore these career pathways. As a RAP student, you have the opportunity to earn 40 credits towards graduation (1000 hours of employment) while being paid to learn a trade and work towards your red seal ticket in a 1-4 year program. Students must have completed their HCS 3000 pre requisites and be minimum 16 years old to be considered for a RAP positon. GRADE 12 STUDENTS MUST SIGN UP FOR MyPass

*Alberta Education has decided that Diploma results will only be available via your MyPass account. *The school cannot create your account on your behalf.

How to sign-up:

1. Go to mypass.alberta.ca

- 2. Create a login using "Sign me up, I'm new!" Do not use your @ngps.ca email. A confirmation link will be sent to your personal inbox.
- 3. Click on the confirmation link in your inbox. Confirm your birthdate and Alberta Student Number. You can find your ASN at https://extranetapp.learning.gov.ab.ca/learnerRegistry/forms/
- 4. Using a button on the subsequent screen, request that a secure verification code be mailed to your home via post. It should arrive within two weeks.
 - 5. Upon receipt in the mail, login and enter the code. It will expire. Act promptly.
 - 6. You will now have access to all of your academic records.



DESIGNED FOR ADDICTION?

This past summer, at a family reunion, I met a third cousin twice removed. While we were trying to figure out how on earth we were related, he shared with me he is attending university taking cell phone app design and development. Interestingly, he said because of what he is studying, he rarely uses his cell phone now and if he does it is for phone calls and texting. He does not use social media. Curious, I inquired as to why that is. He shared with me an alarming insight about phone apps: "they are *purposely* designed to be addicting". Like most parents, I am concerned about my kids' cell phone use (and my own, to be honest). Daily, I am surprised and irritated with how difficult it is for them (and me) to put it down. Why is it a struggle to stop and put the phone away? Are apps seriously designed to be purposively addictive to users? Upon further investigation, I found several articles that confirmed these fears. I have summarized one below, for the parents of Northern Gateway Public Schools, by Hilary Andersson which was published on BBC Panorama on July 4, 2018.

Social media companies are deliberately addicting users to their products for financial gain, Silicon Valley insiders have told the BBC's Panorama programme. "It's as if they're taking behavioural cocaine and just sprinkling it all over your interface and that's the thing that keeps you coming back and back and back", said former Mozilla and Jawbone employee Aza Raskin. "Behind every screen on your phone, there are like a thousand engineers that have worked on this thing to try to make it maximally addicting" he added.

In 2006 Mr. Raskin, a leading technology engineer himself, designed "infinite scroll", one of the features of many apps that is now seen as highly habit forming. At the time, he was working for *Humanized* - a computer user-interface consultancy. Infinite scroll allows users to endlessly swipe down through content without clicking. "If you don't give your brain time to catch up with your impulses," Mr Raskin said, "you just keep scrolling." He said the innovation kept users looking at their phones far longer than necessary.

But, he said, many designers were driven to create addictive app features by the business models of the big companies that employed them. "In order to get the next round of funding, in order to get your stock price up, the amount of time that people spend on your app has to go up," he said.

"So, when you put that much pressure on that one number, you're going to start trying to invent new ways of getting people to stay hooked."

A former Facebook employee made a related point. "Social media is very similar to a slot machine," said Sandy Parakilas, who tried to stop using the service after he left the company in 2012. "It literally felt like I was quitting cigarettes."

One of the most alluring aspects of social media for users is "likes", which can come in the form of the thumbs-up sign, hearts, or retweets.

Leah Pearlman, co-inventor of Facebook's "Like" button, said she had become hooked on Facebook because she had begun basing her sense of self-worth on the number of "likes" she had.

"When I need validation - I go to check Facebook or Instagram," she said."I'm feeling lonely, 'Let me check my phone.' I'm feeling insecure, 'Let me check my phone.' Suddenly, I thought I'm actually also kind of addicted to the feedback."

VULNERABLE YOUTH

Studies indicate there are links between overusing social media and depression, loneliness and a host of other mental problems.

Last year Facebook and Instagram founding president, Sean Parker, said publicly that the company set out to consume as much user time as possible. He claimed it was "*exploiting a vulnerability in human psychology*".

"The inventors," he said, "understood this consciously and we did it anyway."

When confronted with Mr. Parker's allegation that the company had effectively sought to hook people from the outset, senior Facebook official Ime Archibong told the BBC it was still looking into the issue.

Recent reports indicate Facebook is working on features to let users see how much time they have spent on its app over the previous seven days and to set daily time limits.

Twitter declined to comment.

Snapchat said it was happy to support frequent creative use of its app, but it denied using visual tricks to achieve this and added that it had no desire to increase empty engagement of the product.

Clearly, there are many benefits to social media such as entertainment, information, news, community events and staying in contact with friends and family. But as more research comes to light, we must to be discerning, cautious and informed to the risks of over-use and the marketing ploys that are designed to influence us and our children.
