GRADE 9 GLOBAL CONCERNS PROJECT

On November 12, three grade nine classes, 9-1, 9-4, and 9-5 – began a project that was inspired and created by three teachers —Ms. Mehl, Ms. Keay and Ms. Koudelka. This project was created to prototype the new LA and Social curriculums that are being developed in Alberta. With the help of Ms. Damery, from Northern Gateway's School Division's leadership team, the teachers were able to plan a cross curricular project that focused on the students collaborating, developing critical thinking skills, becoming familiar with cross-curricular

competencies and working towards Alberta Education's goal of becoming ethical, engaged and entrepreneurial students.

The students learned what a perspective was and how perspectives differ depending on a person's physical and human geography and access to technology. The students then explored a variety of global issues that were presented to them with the intent of narrowing the topics down to one they connected with. Once they had established a global issue that they wanted to further understand, the continued their research in depth to completely explore and understand that issue. Once they explored the topic's background information and they were able to develop and articulate two differing perspectives on this global concern, they were ready to create a way to communicate their findings to the public.

On Tuesday, November 25, the projects culminated with a gallery walk where all projects, covering a variety of global concerns, were presented to the school and to the public. In order to establish which global issues were seen as most important, visitors were given "Hilltop Currency" to vote for which global concerns warranted more of their dollars.

Once students returned to their regular classes, they were taught business letter writing skills and had to write a business letter to the Prime Minister about why their global issue is in fact an issue and what our federal government could do to help with this global concern.

We were very proud of the students! They worked hard and were able to think in a creative and innovative manner. Furthermore, they were able to see how people and governments have different perspectives on the same topic. The students were engaged and were able to learn in a manner that was quite different from their everyday classes. We look forward to hearing how the students responded to this innovative teaching method and cross curricular project. We are sure that they will have many suggestions about how to improve this method and how Alberta Education can move forward with curriculum design in the future.


Artist of the Month



Tansi! Comfort food is always on the menu, now that the cold weather is here. The staff in Student Services want to ensure that all of our students have warm clothing and a lunch every day. Please come and seek us out if you or a friend are in need, as we would love to help out. I have included this recipe in my article, because it is part of my culture, and it is quick, easy and delicious.

Indian Fry Bread

4 cups flour ½ tsp salt 1 tbsp sugar 1 tbsp baking powder

4 cups oil for frying 1-1/2 cups warm water 111111

Combine dry ingredients, mix in water, knead dough lightly, cut dough into 12 pieces, roll out dough until it is ¼ inch thick, poke a few times with a fork, otherwise dough will puff up. Place in 1 inch of hot oil and fry until golden brown, turning once to brown both sides. Drain on paper towel.

Fry bread is great by itself, with jam, or used as a base for Tacos, or stew, or whatever you can imagine. I hope you enjoy it!

Tips for All Students

General Tips

- Before you begin, find out:
 How much time you will have.
 What materials you will need to complete the test.
- · Skim through the whole test before beginning.
- · Read all instructions carefully.
- · Ask questions if you are unsure of something
- · Answer the easy questions first and then go back to the harder ones.
- Double-check to make sure you have answered everything before handing in the test.

Multiple Choice Tests

- Skim through the entire test. Find out how many questions there are and plan your time accordingly.
- Do not spend too much time on any one question. Make a note beside a difficult question and go back to it if you have time.
- Read each question carefully, underline key words, and try to think of an answer before looking at the choices.
- Read all the choices and see which one best fits the answer that you thought of.
- When you are not sure which answer is correct, cross out/erase any choices that you know are wrong.
- If time permits, recheck your answers

ACHIEVEMENT TEST RULES:

- Students may not enter or leave the test room without the consent of the supervising teacher.
- 2. No notes in any form, papers, information dictionaries, electronic dictionaries, or books relating to a test may be brought into the test room, or used by a student, unless expressed permitted to so by the test administration instructions.
- 3. No electronics or paper templates and/or graphic organizers are allowed for the writing of written response achievement tests.
- Students may not bring into the test room or use any headsets, digital audio players, cell phones, or other electronic devices.
- 5. Students may not talk, whisper, or communicate in other ways with one another while a test is being written.
- 6. Students may not share or exchange any test writing tools or materials while in the test room.
- Any student that violates Achievement Test Rules, falsify test responses or results, disrupts other students or commit any other act may have their test invalidated.



DECEMBER = DANCE, DANCE, DANCE...

It is that time of year again....DANCE! PE students will be participating in our social dance unit, which teaches students a wide variety of both partner and "icebreaker"-style dances, from December 9 - 19. Dance is an excellent activity for physical health and well-being. In addition to this, social dance teaches adolescents appropriate etiquette and behaviors that they may carry on into their adult lives.

The social dance unit covers many of the specific outcomes as outlined by the Government of Alberta, but it specifically meets the following learner outcomes MANDATED by the Alberta Government:

APPLICATION OF BASIC SKILLS IN DANCE

- * Create, refine and present a variety of dance sequences alone and with others (grade 9)
- * Apply the principles of dance to improve performance (PE 10)
- Develop and perform more complex dances (PE 20)
- * Develop, refine and perform more complex dances (PE 30)
- Choreograph and perform dance sequences, using the elements of movement and basic dance steps and patterns (grade 9)
- * Choreograph and perform dances for self and others (PE 10)
- * Choreograph, perform and interpret dance for self and others (PE 20)
- * Choreograph, perform and critique dance for self and others (PE 30)

All students enrolled in Physical Education this semester are required to participate in the social dance unit.
