In early December 2016, 18 year old professional race car drive and founder of the **Drive to Stay Alive Campaign Parker Thompson** spoke to Hilltop students about the importance of driving responsibly. Parker started driving race cars at a very young age. By age 13 he was 3rd in the world, by 14 he was competing in Italy and by age 16 he was racing professionally. Mr. Thompson used his experiences as a professional driver to talk about the dangers of distracted driving. There are 4 million distracted driving related accidents in Canada every year, it is the leading cause of death in todays youth. It only takes seconds for an accident to occur while driving is 6 times more dangerous than drinking , although neither should ever be done while operating a vehicle. 50% of people who die in distracted driving related accidents were not the ones who caused it or made that choice. Parker mentioned how a race track is a safer place to drive than the streets. He explained how race cars are designed for speed and impact, and

how a regular street car is not. Mr. Thompson encouraged students to choose their actions wisely when behind the wheel, drive to stay alive. He offered some suggestions for students, such as: keep your cell phones out of reach while driving to avoid temptation, consider asking a passenger to reply to incoming messages, pull over to answer a call or text, or if possible, install a hands free device in your vehicle. The mission of the campaign is to put an end to distracted driving in North America, with the goal to reach over 100 000 students across Canada and the USA. On December 16th, 2016 the **Whitecourt Youth Advisory Committee** held a town hall meeting at Hilltop. In attendance were the six youth who form the committee, along with Mayor Chichak and Town Councillors Darlene Chartrand, Derek Schlosser and Bill McAree. The event marked the third town hall meeting for the Youth Advisory Committee. The committee stressed how important it is to hear from the youth in our community and how their voices matter. The Youth Advisory Committee have been involved in a number of projects so far, such as: fundraising for the skate park, Crime Stoppers Youth and volunteering for Cool Camp and The Children's Festival. The committee is also hoping to get directly involved in the new Arts and Culture building coming to Whitecourt soon. During the town hall meeting, the committee asked to hear from students with a question period. The students asked about many different aspects of our community, from expansions with Eastlink Park to upgrades to the hospital. They also explored the

ideas of a mountain biking park, sled drag racing and possible modifications to the Cadets building. Mayor Chichak thanked everyone who participated in the town hall meeting and reassured the students how important the voice of today's youth can be in making a difference. Derek Schlosser explained to the youth that you have three choices with your lives, you can make things happen, watch things happen or be the one who asked what happened.

# Parents of Students in Grade 9

In January and June of this school year, all Grade 9 students throughout the province will write the provincial achievement tests in language arts, math, science and social studies. Results for these tests will provide Alberta Education, school administrators, teachers, parents, students, and the public with information about what students know and can do in relation to provincial standards at the end of Grade 9.

Achievement tests are based on what students have been learning. Teachers mark them before they are returned to Alberta Education. This allows the teachers to look at the performance of the students in their class and to use each student's achievement test score at 20% of their final grade.

In the fall, an Individual Student Profile showing your child's achievement test results will be available at the school. You child will be given the results to bring home. The profile is prepared by Alberta Education after the marking and scoring of tests has been completed and final scores are calculated; it will present your child's performance on each test in relation to provincial standards. This information may be useful in planning your child's instructional program for the coming year.

Reports that show how well Hilltop High School students did as a group in relation to provincial standards will also be available at our school in the fall

Please also be advised that CTF Options for all Grade 9 students are now percentage based and no longer outcome based. This new policy will take effect for term eighths 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8.



# Helpful Hint from the Family Community Liaison Program (FCLP)

Are you concerned about your child's use of electronics? In today's world, both kids and adults are extremely connected to this virtual world of games and media. With the explosion of video games and social media came a whole new set of concerns for parents. Here are a few tips on how to limit technology and use it safely within your family:

- 1. Take responsibility for your child's use of technology. As a parent, you have some decisions to make. Which electronics do you want to let into your house? How can you teach your child to use each one responsibly? At what age will you introduce each screen to your child?
- 2. Walk YOUR talk. It doesn't need to be said that if you are constantly on your phone, your child will likely end up the same way. As a parent, you need to evaluate whether what you are doing on your technology is truly more important than having a conversation or spending time with your child.
- 3. Guide your child. Most children often exhibit 'addictive' behaviour in one way or another when using electronics, so it is important to help guide your child on how to manage a healthy relationship with electronics. Some ways in doing so include:
- Keeping all screens in a public area for use.
- Use timers to monitor how much time is spent using each device.
- Monitor your child's behaviour both on and offline.
- Be the computer administrator, and ensure it is locked and password protected when not in use.
- Schedule technology free time.
- No screen time until after homework, chores, etc. is finished.

# **Toastmasters Youth Leadership Program**

The Youth Leadership Program is a workshop consisting of **eight one to two-hour sessions** that enable participants to develop communication and leadership skills through practical experience. **The program is presented during or after school, or on weekends**. Participants learn to:

- Evaluate present speaking ability
- Organize and give speeches
- Give impromptu talks
- Control voice, vocabulary and gestures
- Give constructive feedback and more



Each Youth Leadership Program group is **limited to 25 people**. Participants are selected by the sponsoring Toastmasters club or by a cooperating organization (such as a school).

A local Toastmasters club serves as sponsor and provides a coordinator to present the program. The individual coordinator attends each meeting, where he or she will lead most of the presentations and counsel participants. The coordinator assigns an assistant who can fill in for the coordinator should he or she be unable to attend a meeting. **Meetings generally follow a format similar to that of a Toastmasters club meeting**, including an announced agenda, practice in parliamentary procedure, and the selection of presiding officers.

# What is FLEX?

# This article pertains to FLEX Block. This should bring some clarity on this topic.

# What is FLEX Block?

Preparing our students to be life-long learners is about Learning Recovery and Personal Learning Time. Often students may fall behind in a course because of an illness, a fieldtrip, etc. – Learning Recovery. Sometimes, students have difficulty with key concepts and need some extra support and practice in those areas – Personal Learning Time. While both of these currently occur here at Hilltop, they tend to take place outside of the school day making attendance difficult for students who work or catch busses. Time has been built into our year's calendar and schedule for students to attend Tutorials to achieve this within the regular day.

Approximately twice a month, students will have the period prior to lunch (period 3) for Learning Recovery and/or Personal Learning Time. This Tutorial period is supervised and students are expected to attend when they have a teacher request they do so. Parents must be contacted with the relevant information ahead of time so that they can help to support the student learning at home. Students and parents may also request the student participate in these sessions. Any students who are not referred or do not request Tutorial will have an extended lunch hour on these days, grade 9 students are required to remain on campus for the duration of block 3. Meanwhile, teachers will be working in groups (Professional Learning Communities-PLCs) to create common lessons, units and assessments as well as to analyze Hilltop's relevant data so as to continue to improve upon the education programs we provide to our students.


# Where can I find the dates and times for FLEX Block?



# **Program Description**

The Service Rig program is offered in partnership with Northern Lights Public Schools. The course content was provided by the Canadian Association of Oilwell Drilling Contractors. The course involves comprehensive coverage of the oil and gas industry, safety, the operations of a service rig, and the duties of a rig floorhand. 




