


Sports and Fitness Program Participants

On February 15, Rupertsland Institute offered a presentation to our Metis students in grades 9-12 about the many opportunities available to them within post-secondary, summer camps and employment. Andrea Jenkins from Rupertsland explained to students the importance of getting a Metis card so they could utilize these opportunities and provided them with applications. Rupertsland offers funding for post-secondary students and will help with living accommodations as well. Rupertsland also offers summer camps for youth aged 15-18. One of the summer camps coming up is an intro guide into outdoor careers, such as an Environmentalist. The two week camp offers hands on training in the wilderness, WHIMIS, Wilderness First Aid, high school credit and \$1000.00 upon completion. Rupertsland also partners with employers within the community and offers summer employment opportunities for returning students with targeted wage subsidy. Thank you Rupertsland for coming to

Telephone Surveys

As in previous years, the Ministry of Education will be conducting its annual stakeholder satisfaction telephone surveys to collect public and other stakeholder perceptions of Alberta's education system.

The surveys gather responses from a random sample of parents, the general public, high school students, teachers, principals, superintendents and school board trustees in the province. The total number of completed surveys will be over 6,000, ensuring that survey results for each of the 10 respondent groups are statistically representative. The survey responses are completely confidential, and only aggregate data will be reported.

The purpose of the surveys is to determine stakeholders' satisfaction with:

• the overall quality of the education system;

• the education system meeting the needs of students and supporting our society and the economy;

- schools providing a safe, caring and inclusive environment for students;
- preparation of students for lifelong learning, employment and active citizenship;
- the education system having effective working relationships with partners and stakeholders;
- leadership and continuous improvement of the education system;
- knowledge, skills, abilities and other related attributes of recent high school graduates; and
- facilities and equipment in the education system.

Your participation is important, as it provides valuable information to help the ministry identify areas of strength and areas needing improvement, thus helping provide a more effective and accountable education system. Some survey results are also used in specific business plan performance measures and will be reported in the ministry's 2016-17 annual report.

Advanis Inc., an Alberta-based firm, has been contracted to administer the telephone interviews beginning on **February 13, 2017** and finishing **mid-April 2017**. A summary of the information resulting from the survey will be posted on Education's website. 
attend often, make better progress. Remember to pass in your course work in a timely manner. If you need help with your work please drop by or call us.

Helpful Hint from the Family Community Liaison Program (FCLP)

Emotional intelligence is a skill that must be developed, just like learning to read or ride a bike. Here are 5 easy ways to help your child build their emotional intelligence.

1. Accept and acknowledge your child's emotions. Tell them that you recognize what they are feeling. It may also help to explain that sometimes we can't choose those emotions, but we CAN choose how we handle those emotions. Talk to your child about what they feel is an appropriate way to express those emotions, and draw boundaries when necessary.

2. When in doubt, empathize. Your empathy and acceptance helps your child accept their emotions, which is what allows them to resolve their feelings and move on. Your empathy teaches them that their emotional life is not dangerous, is not shameful, and is in fact manageable.


3. Don't try to distract them from their feelings. And don't shame them when they get hurt, both physically and emotionally. Acknowledge, empathize, let them show you or tell you what happened and give them a little time to process what they are feeling. Then they will be ready to move on.

4. Repressing feelings does not work. Disapproving of their fear or anger won't stop them from having those feelings. Repressed feelings don't fade away; repressed feelings are trapped and looking for a way out, which can be often exhibited in a negative way such as violence or defiance.

5. Model emotional intelligence. What they see you do is what they will do. Do you start snapping at people when you're under stress? Have minor tantrums when things go wrong? Can you stay calm during emotionally charged discussions? Do you empathize when feelings are expressed? Children model the behaviour that they see at home, so make sure you are being a great role model for your children.



School Memo re: Mumps

To: Students, Parents and Staff of Alberta Schools From the Alberta Medical Officers of Health

Date: 2017-Feb-21

Outbreaks of mumps in Manitoba and the United States in the past several months are a reminder that vaccine-preventable infections, including mumps, are still a risk to health, including here in Alberta. To reduce the risk to your child, and our communities, we need to ensure as many Albertans as possible are up to date with their mumps immunization. This includes yourself, and your children.

Mumps is a contagious viral infection that can often cause swelling and pain in the jaw (one or both cheeks may look swollen). Some people with mumps won't have gland swelling, and some may feel like they have a bad cold or influenza instead.

Mumps is spread when an infected person coughs or sneezes near you or shares food or drinks with you. A person with mumps can spread the virus seven days before and for nine days after symptoms start, though it is most likely to spread the virus one to two days before and five days after symptoms start showing.

Although mumps usually goes away on its own in about 10 days, in some cases, it can cause serious complications that affect the brain (meningitis), the testicles (orchitis), the ovaries (oophoritis), or the pancreas (pancreatitis). These complications can have life-long effects.

Mumps can be prevented through immunization (vaccine).

The MMR (measles, mumps, and rubella) vaccine, and the MMRV (measles, mumps, rubella, and varicella [chickenpox]) vaccine, both protect against mumps. Most children get these vaccines as part of their routine childhood shots. The first dose is given at age one, and a second dose at age four.

The vaccine is safe, and is also effective. Before the mumps vaccine existed, mumps was a common childhood disease in Canada and the United States.

Protect yourself, and your children:

- Check your own and your children's immunization records to be sure that you and your children are up to date on your vaccines. Call Health Link (811) if you are unsure how to find or check your immunization records, and/or to learn how to make an appointment for immunization. Mumps-specific recommendations include:
 - Children should receive one dose of vaccine at 12 months of age, and a second dose between four
 years and six years of age. By the age of six, all Albertan children should have received two doses of
 mumps-containing vaccine.
 - Adults (18 years of age and older) and born in 1970 or later should have at least one dose of mumpscontaining vaccine. (Note: two doses are recommended for post-secondary students of this age and for all healthcare workers)
 - Those born before 1970 are assumed to be immune due to the fact that mumps was extremely common prior to vaccine being available. (Note: one dose is recommended for post-secondary students of this age; two doses are recommended for all healthcare workers).
- Anyone with symptoms of pain on chewing or swallowing and/or swelling of the cheek or jaw should call Health Link (811) or a doctor to book an assessment and consideration of testing. If you think that you or your child has mumps, be sure to call ahead and explain the symptoms <u>before</u> you go to a doctor's office.
- 3. Anyone with symptoms as above should stay home from school/work for 5 days from the start of swelling.
- 4. To prevent spreading infections, always:
 - Practice good hand hygiene wash hands often with soap and water, or use alcohol hand rub.
 - Avoid sharing items that could be contaminated with saliva, such as water bottles, drinking glasses, utensils, etc.
 - Clean and disinfect surfaces that are touched often (e.g. door handles).
 - · Cover coughs or sneezes with a tissue or a forearm, not your hand.
